Notes on Aztlán:

The word Aztlán first became a firmament in the consciousness of the Chicano community during the years 1966-67 with the seminal lectures conducted at San Diego State University by Chicano poet Alurista and others. These lectures anticipated the delivery of the seminal revolutionary manifesto "El Plan Espiritual de Aztlán", authored by Carlo Muñoz, Jr. et. al., and first read at the First National Chicano Youth Conference in Denver, Colorado on March 1969. During the intervening years, the word Aztlán has come to encompass the concepts: (1) the historical/mythical place of origin of the Aztecs (whose name is derived from Aztlán); site from which Aztec tribes originated their migration in 1111 A.D., culminating two hundred years later in the foundation of Tenochtitlán, modern Mexico City; (2) the popular symbolic name for either the Southwest of the United States, where most Mexican-Americans live, or for the metaphorical space that exists wherever Chicano culture flourishes; and, (3) a territory whose autonomy under Chicano sovereignty should be sought by political or revolutionary action, a Chicano homeland, if you will.

Geographically, Aztlán's cartography is located within areas of California, Nevada, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Texas, and Wyoming, within the territories that were ceded to the United States after the ratification of the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo in 1848, ending the Mexican War fought by the United States and Mexico. However, for purposes of this DATABASE, Aztlán should be regarded from the perspective of a critical imaginary, a cultural archetype symbolic of the spiritual union of La Raza (the Chicano Bodypolitic) irrespective of Geographical limits or boundaries.
